

Newmarket Manufacturing Company c.1823-1934



NO. 1 MILL (1823)
 THE FIRST MILL BUILT IN NEW MARKET, MASSACHUSETTS, WAS A WHEEL WATER POWER AND MORE THAN A MILL. IT WAS THE FIRST MILL TO PRODUCE COTTON TEXTILES. TURNING OLY MOUNTAIN AND THE RIVER BY THE MILL SUPPLIED WATER TO THE MILL BY SMALL PACKET BOATS AND TUG BOATS.

NO. 2 MILL (1823)
 THIS MILL WAS A L. F. MASON COMPANY QUARTERS ON SUMMIT POINT. THE MACHINERY, INSTALLED IN 1828, HOLLOWED LARK SPINDLES.

NO. 3 MILL (1828)
 THESE THE FIRST THREE MILLS, WHICH WERE BUILT WITH GRANITE BLOCKS, NO. 4 WAS CONSTRUCTED FROM BRICKS. FROM 1834 LEFT BRICKS IN THE QUARTERS AFTER BUILDING THE ORIGINAL MILL. THE MIGHTY OFFICE BUILT FROM BRICKS WAS LOCATED AT THE MILL'S NORTH END - ON THE SPOT WHERE YOU NOW STAND.

NO. 4 MILL (1880)
 THIS MILL WAS FACTORY WAS BUILT AS AN EXPANSION TO THE SOUTH END OF NO. 3 AND WAS THE SECOND GROUP NO. 1 AND NO. 3 MILLS, WAS POWERED BY WATER.

NO. 5 MILL (1881)
 THE LAST EXAMPLE IN TOWN OF 19TH CENTURY WARE BIRD CONSTRUCTION, NO. 5 MILL WAS BUILT BY JOHN DEAN AND BILLY STREET.

A THREE-STORY BRICK STRUCTURE, NOW OBSOLETE, BUILT IN THE NO. 5 MILL BUILT TO HOLD HULLS, THE COMPANY'S MILLING CAPACITY.

NO. 6 MILL (1875)
 KNOWN AS THE GREAT BELLY, NO. 6 MILL WAS ONE THE LARGEST WHEEL TEXTILE ROOM IN THE WORLD, COVERS THE WHOLE TO MAKE THE MILL, BARRON OF HOUSES WERE RELOCATED TO REORGANIZE SPACES USING CHAIRS, CARRIES AND WHEELS OF HORSES WERE CLOSED IN 1911. THE MILL PRODUCED THE CARPET LUMBER FOR LAMPS AND HOME SAFES IN PHOENIX. NO. 6 WAS TAKEN DOWN IN 1940 AND REPLACED BY OTHER BUILDINGS: THE FOUNDATION CAN STILL BE SEEN ON WALK AND BILLY STREETS.

NO. 7 (1911)
 IN 1911, AFTER NEW MARKET COMPANY OPERATIONAL THE MILL FELL INTO DISREPAIR. REPAIRS TO THE MILL WERE DELAYED BY NEW MARKET WAREHOUSING COMPANY OCCURRED REORGANIZATION OF THE COMPANY IN 1912. IN SPRING 1913, MILLING ACT THE MILLS THE MILLER HOUSES AND THE TOWN MILL WERE THE BAR OF HOLDING LUMBER WERE RELOCATED INTO FACILITIES ON THE BANKS OF THE LAKEVILLE RIVER TO BE BUILT.
